A Message from the Principal

Dear Rebel Parents,

We are already well into the first quarter. I hope your son or daughter is having a positive experience this year at Fairfax High. We are continuing to focus on our three goals of increasing student achievement, strengthening school climate, and expanding professional learning communities to enhance student and faculty learning.

Here are some frequent questions I've been asked about the school and our new programs:

How is the Rewards and Remediation (R&R) program going?

R&R is a program that rewards students for academic achievement while providing extra help during the school day for struggling students. The program has already had tremendous success. Fairfax High School has reduced students with Fs in SOL classes by 58% in two years. We are introducing the program earlier in the year so that students can take advantage of the opportunity sooner to improve their academic performance. We will continue to assess the impact of R&R on student achievement throughout the school year.

Is renovation complete?

Renovation is all but complete. Since the summer we have received a new foreign language lab, new sound and light systems in the auditorium and a new track for our stadium. We also expect to do some finishing work in our stadium late this fall and early next summer. Thank you all for your patience during this process.

What is Rebel Roundup?

Mark your calendar now on November 11th at 7:30am for Rebel Roundup! This new program for parents allows you to have brief (2-3 minutes) but meaningful mini-conferences with your son or daughter's teachers. You will have their 1st quarter grades and can get great feedback about how they are doing in school. We hope this program strengthens communication between parents and the school. We know that together we can make sure every student does his or her very best at Fairfax High School.

Dave and Gwen explained the Academy Improvement Plan, the Creative Leaders Project which is sponsored by the Academy's partnership with the Apple Credit Union Educational Foundation, and the Summer Community Theatre Program. Governor’s School

There will be a Governor’s School interest meeting held on Wednesday, October 1 in the Multipurpose Room during pride time. All interested **juniors and sophomores** are invited to attend.

The Governor’s School program began in 1973 when Gov. Linwood Holton established the first summer residential program for 400 gifted students from across Virginia. The program has expanded to serving more than 7,500 gifted students from all parts of the commonwealth. Governor’s School offers the state’s most able students academically and artistically challenging programs beyond those offered in their home schools.

The areas of study are visual and performing arts; humanities; agriculture; math, science, and technology; and foreign language. Mentorships are also offered in Life sciences and medicine, Marine science, and engineering/NASA.

Students focus on one special area of intellectual or artistic strength and interest and study in a way that best suits the gifted learner’s needs. Each program stresses non-traditional teaching and learning techniques. Students are involved in classroom and laboratory work, field studies, research, individual and group projects and performances, and seminars with noted scholars, visiting artists, and other professionals. Students live on a college campus up to 5 weeks during the summer and have the opportunity to live, study and get to know other students with similar interests and abilities from across Virginia.

Students are chosen based on academic records, test scores, extra-curricular activities, honors and awards, creativity, original essays, teacher recommendations, strong desire to learn, and a clean discipline record. Mott Community Center

The Mott Community Center offers a FREE after school program for Fairfax County teens. The program runs from 2-6PM Monday-Friday. It is located at 12111 Braddock Rd. in Fairfax. Teen services also offers programming at the Mott Center on teacher workdays, both winter and spring breaks, but are closed on holidays.

Participants will have access to a state of the art computer lab and will also be provided with a quiet study area with homework assistance, sports programming, gym, art club, gaming club, teen forums, field trips and more. The after school clubs and activities are youth driven and youth led. Each

quarter (every 8 weeks) teens will decide what trips, clubs and other activities in which they wish to participate. Limited transportation is available from Fairfax HS to the Mott Community Center. Late Buses

So, what are these late buses? How do they work? Who can ride them? Where do they go? Now that the late buses are running, it's time to answer all of those questions.

Late buses are available on Mondays and Thursdays. On Mondays the late buses depart Fairfax High School at 3PM. On Thursdays buses depart at 4PM. The late buses are provided to enable students to stay after school and do homework, meet with teachers or attend meetings. The library is open on days the late buses run.

Late bus routes can differ from the normal route your student is used to. Each subschool office has a complete list of the late buses and their routes posted on their hall window. Your student simply needs to find the correct bus number and get on at the assigned time. It may be a little scary the first time your student tries it, but it's a great benefit you'll want to become acquainted with.

Sometimes questions arise about late bus schedules not matching sports practice schedules. Late buses are intended to help students with their academic commitments and unfortunately do not usually match sports practice schedules.

Alcohol: Myths & Facts

A great many parents and teenagers are uninformed or misinformed on the subject of alcohol. This can lead to behavior that can be harmful to both children and parents. Below are listed some statements that illustrate common attitudes concerning alcohol and the explanation for why these statements are false.

“My child would never drink.”

Don't bet on it. Teens face tremendous pressure from peers to drink—at parties, sporting events, proms, etc. This pressure is reinforced by advertisers who show drinking as a fun and harmless activity. Remember, eight out of ten high school students have tried alcohol.

“Drinking isn't so bad. At least they're not into 'drugs'.”

Alcohol is a drug and it can be just as harmful to teenagers as other drugs. Alcohol is a major factor in the three leading causes of death among young people—accidents, homicides and suicides. It has also been proven that alcohol is a “gateway drug” for teens. Once addicted to alcohol, many students move on to other drugs like marijuana and cocaine.

“Drinking is just a teenage rite of passage—it's a phase that will pass.”

The younger teenagers are when they start drinking, the more likely they are to be heavier drinkers throughout their lives. For all age groups, persons who began drinking before 17 have roughly two to five times the rates of heavy drinking as do their peers who began drinking after 21.

“If my child does drink, it's just to be social at parties—it's not as if he/she has a 'problem'.”

Studies have found that most students who drink use alcohol to handle stress or boredom. When youth drink they tend to drink intensively, often consuming four to five drinks at one time. NIAAA data show that 11 percent of 8th graders, 22 percent of 10th graders, and 29 percent of 12th graders had engaged in heavy episodic, or binge, drinking within the past two weeks. Thirty-nine percent say they drink alone; 58 percent drink when they are upset; 30 percent drink when they are bored; and 37 percent drink to feel high.

What is a Pathways student?

Pathways is a program that is targeted at **seniors** who might choose to attend NOVA and then transfer to George Mason University. It's a program designed to help ease what can be a confusing process for both the student and the parents.

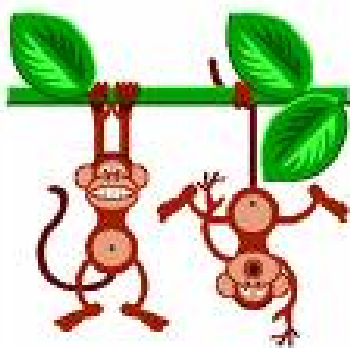
Fairfax High School has a counselor specifically trained to guide Pathways students. Jayna Turner, our Pathways counselor, is new to our school this year. She works part time at Fairfax High School and part time at Northern Virginia Community College (NOVA).

If accepted into the Pathways program, the Fairfax HS student will receive individual counseling on college transition issues, attend special workshops and receive early placement testing and priority course registration for their first semester at NOVA. If academically qualified a student could pursue options to earn college credit while finishing high school.

The Pathways program continues on at NOVA, with special counseling available, academic support services, and the opportunity to apply early for junior year admission to George Mason University. Admission at Mason is contingent upon completing your Associate's Degree at NOVA with a 2.5 GPA.

Students interested in the Pathways program need to apply, and the deadline for application is November 1, 2008. There is no minimum GPA required to apply. Applications are available from your regular guidance counselor or by contacting Jayna Turner directly, (703) 933-5087 or jaturner@nvcc.edu.

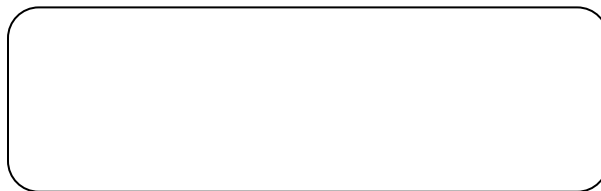
